# Roger<sup>TM</sup> system

# Connectivity options

Use Roger™ or Bluetooth accessory like Naida CI Connect to connect to a computer or tablet. Contact AB to purchase.

- Use a (Y) splitter to connect two output devices to the computer or tablet so you can hear with your child.
- Encourage the teacher to wear an external mic to make it easier for your child to hear their voice.

# Help your child succeed in school using the tips below



## Technology & Access

Perform a daily listening check on hearing devices. Create a troubleshooting kit:

- Order back-up batteries, cables and a headpiece.
- Use the Naida CI listening check to listen to your child's CI.
- Download My Naida CI App to help with troubleshooting.

# Learning Strategies

Help your child understand vocabulary:

- Explain how you would use an unfamiliar word
- Describe the concept represented by the unfamiliar word
- Pair a familiar phrase or concept with a sophisticated word ("mmm, good is another way to say the treat was delicious")



#### Educational Team Collaboration

Discuss the best way to contact each of your child's educational team members:

- Sign release forms for communication between the clinic and school at the start of the school year
- Identify how to communicate: email, phone calls, text messages or FaceTime calls
- It may take multiple attempts to connect and communicate



#### Environmental Considerations

For virtual learning, ask teachers to modify the background to maximize visual cues:

- · Use a solid, simple, clean background
- Use good lighting to make lip reading and focus easier
- Minimize background noise to make focused listening easier
